Let's suppose for a minute that what Paul was referring to was *not* physical illness. The fact is, the word "infirmity" is being used here. And before everyone says "but the greek says...!" ... the word is a correct translation. (most who defer to the greek don't know anything about greek anyway).

What is the definition of the word "infirmity"?

INFIRMITY

1. a physical weakness or ailment: the infirmities of age.
2. quality or state of being infirm; lack of strength.
3. a moral weakness or failing.

Now, infirmity can be illness, or it can be a poor state of living (i.e. beatings, persecution etc.), or it can be moral failings.

Paul does not say which it is for sure. Many believe it was an eye problem that was residual from the blindness he experienced at his conversion. And the Bible is also quite clear that some spiritual oppression can bring on physical illness. Yet I doubt that Paul would leave himself open to demonic oppression because that would contradict the vast majority of his writings concerning how we as Christians should live. If you live your life according to the Bible, and love God with all your heart... the devil will **flee** from you! Not oppress you.

I believe that the "messenger" from Satan was the same thing as what Job experienced, but on a smaller scale. Job experienced more infirmities than anyone in history. And some of those infirmities were illnesses.

This "messenger" that Paul experienced **was** more than likely an illness of some sort. Why did God allow this? I believe t he keep Paul humble. That's why God said "My grace is sufficient for you"... to remind Paul that without the grace of Go d... Paul was nothing. It was God's grace that sustained him. That strengthened him. Nothing Paul had done in his flesh could do for him what God's grace could.

Of course, many of Paul's infirmities did come in the form of persecution... but Paul counted it **all joy** to be persecuted fo r the Lord's sake. He didnt see persecution as a bad thing. He had the right perspective. Of course, no one looks forwar d to being stoned to death, or whipped, or shipwrecked... but in each instance Paul was singing the praises of God, and using these situations as an opportunity to preach the gospel.

So tho persecution was an "infirmity" that Paul endured... not one time do we see Paul asking the Lord to remove it from him. In fact, he welcomed it.

So here is Paul... asking **three** times for the Lord to remove this particular "infirmity". God answered "no". I believe it was an illness of some sort. I believe Paul was sick of feeling sick, and also believed that this illness hindered him from minis tering even more than he was. So he requested God to remove it from him.

Of course, the health & wealth crowd say "it wasnt an illness!". What else are they going to say? To admit that God didnt heal Paul is to shatter the entire theology of the heretical WOF movement. So they say "you need to check the greek!" T his is a smoke and mirrors move. They know full well the average Christian doesnt know greek, much less even have a greek Bible in their house. It's a way of getting people who disagree with them to shut up. Kinda like when people start in on Benny Hinn... ol' Benny yells "Touch not the Lord's annointed" and then begin to pronounce curses on their critics.

I say God's Word is clear. If you take 2 Corinthians 12 in context of the entire NT (I know taking things in context is a ne w concept for some people... but you should really try it), and then use a little deductive reasoning... it's easy to see why more theologians... and lay people like me... have come to the correct conclusion that Paul suffered some sort of physic al illness.

And God chose, according to His perfect will, not to heal him.

Luke 5:17

One day as he was teaching, Pharisees and teachers of the law, who had come from every village of Galilee and from Judea and Jerusalem, were sitting there. **And the power of the Lord was present for him to heal the sick.**

This statement, made in the context it is made assumes that Jesus didn't always have the power to heal the sick, or he didn't in fact always heal the sick. There is no other way to explain this verse.

Now I would also like to mention that Luke is the most meticulous Gospel in that it was written by a physician, Luke, a doctor, Paul's travel companion. His teaching was that we seek the healer, not the healing. This sets right with me because the woman with the issue of blood said it she could but touch the hem of His garment she would be healed. According to your faith be it unto you.

Now I know again the quote will be Paul accepting his thorn in the flesh. I say if God comes to you and tells you He wants to leave you the way you are after fully seeking Him then receive it and His grace will be sufficient for you and me. I have read Joni Erickson's testimony myself and God told her He was leaving her unhealed for a reason, so she accepted it. However until God tells me different I will take Him at His word "sozo" and press in to touch the hem of His garment.

I think part of the hinderence to healing, please note I said part, is that we don't press into God we press into healing. I have walked in God's word for healing for over thirty years and it is true. Have I never struggled, yes, but that doesn't change the word of God. When I touch Him I receive His healing.

If we would spend as much time on our faces worshipping Him and basking in His presence as we do on these computers we would experience that glory and would walk in more of the provision than we do. I am certain of it.

Healing is one of the ways that Jesus shows his glory on earth, but not the only way. He performed signs and miracles in Tyre and Sidon, but they were unbelieving. Jesus can heal someone who is in unbelief -just like the man lowered through the roof was healed by the faith of his friends.

Jesus, as I have already mentioned, the verse in Luke 5 which you have avoided, is said to have been filled with healing power at certain times, which also implies that he was not filled with healing power at other times, or chose not always to heal.

A lot of times healing is a first step for someone into the faith, like the woman with issue of bleeding -not an issue of faith in an ongoing relationship with Jesus. CS Lewis had to deal with 'the problem of pain' and I doubt very many would dispute his anointing.

Paul was sick, there were people sick in the early church (verses have already been provided to state this fact) timothy could have been blown over by a gust of wind.

Ben, I really enjoy how you take Timothy's ephod, but not Timothy's cross! Timothy had an anointed ministry, but he was also weak in the flesh. Jesus suffered affliction at Gethsemane, he bore the whole sin of the world on his shoulders, and sweated drops of blood... that's not a normal occurrence. There is a medical explanation, people can actually sweat blood, but it is an extremely rare medical condition, a sickness! Does that mean Jesus was sick? I am trying to be as thorough as I can, but frankly, there have been about five to ten things I have to respond to on each thread, each time I get on. It's a lot to handle.

Anyhow, I will go ahead and address it as best I can:

The scripture does not say that Jesus was "filled with healing power at certain times".

What it does say is:

Luke 5:17

17And it came to pass on a certain day, as he was teaching, that there were Pharisees and doctors of the law sitting by, which were come out of every town of Galilee, and Judaea, and Jerusalem: and the power of the Lord was present to heal them.

Is Jesus Christ the power of God in the flesh or not?

If you believe He is not, then it is obvious to me why you don't believe as I do.

If you believe that He is, then tell me when the power of God does not have the ability to heal?

And you must use scripture to prove when He doesn't.

(Just a little footnote to get you started in your quest for the truth.) Jesus told the disciples that if they had seen Him, then they had seen the Father. He was telling them that He was God in the flesh.

Quote:
-----A lot of times healing is a first step for someone into the faith, like the woman with issue of bleeding -not an issue of faith in an ongoing relationship with Jesus. CS Lewis had to deal with 'the problem of pain' and I doubt very many would dispute his anointing.

Anointing, and faith are two different things. Faith grows by the hearing of God's word, Paul makes that clear in Romans.

Quote:
-----Paul was sick, there were people sick in the early church (verses have already been provided to state this fact) timothy could have been blown over by a gust of wind.

Paul does not say he was sick, he says that it was a messenger of satan. The infirmity he mentions, is his weakness. Not a sickness, that is only an opinion.

I want anyone who wants to use this argument again to go look up what a "messenger of satan" means in the original language. Also look up the word "buffet". That might help you understand what Paul was actually talking about.

As for people being sick in the early church, when did I ever say that there were none? That isn't even a point of contention for me. They were sick, they lacked faith, so what? Jesus wasn't sick, and He certainly did not lack faith. And He is the example we are to model ourselves after primarily, and the disciples secondarily.

Paul says: "Emulate me, as I emulate Christ." Meaning if I don't emulate Christ, then don't emulate what I did.

The reason you give offence is not because people reject truth (even if you happen to be 100% right) but because you are behaving like Job's friends. This is also why you come over as very young.

Job's friends said quite a lot of true things, but they were still wrong; because they condemned Job instead of helping him.

Sin wasn't actually the cause of Job's suffering; so their theology was one-sided and incomplete, as, I believe, is yours. Their words also increased Job's suffering and was no help to him at all!

Job wasn't 100% faultless, but the fact remains that in his case his suffering was *not* the result of any sin.

But the real problem wasn't their theology but their *attitude*.

To say to a sick person that its their fault that they're sick (even if it happens to be true in that particular case) is **just about the most cruel thing you could say to them**.

The only exception would be if the Lord specifically revealed the reason they were not healed, **and actually told you to confront them with this**.

I can only think of one example where Jesus did this with a sick person, and then only after having healed him! That was the man at the Pool of Siloam. Jesus said, "sin no more, lest a worse thing befall you", implying that it was sin that had caused this particular man's sickness.

-----This does not mean sickness is always from God or that God always inflicts us with sickness to teach us a spiritual lesson. In a world tainted by sin, sickness, disease, and death will always be with us. We are fallen beings, with physical bodies prone to disease and illness. Some sickness is simply a result of the natural course of things in this world. Sickness can also be the result of a demonic attack. The Bible describes several instances when physical suffering was caused by Satan and his demons (Matthew 17:14-18; Luke 13:10-16). So, some sickness is not from God, but from Satan. Even in these instances, **God is still in control. God sometimes allows sin and/or Satan to cause physical suffering**. Even when sickness is not directly from God, **He will still use it according to His perfect will**.

It is undeniable, though, that God sometimes intentionally allows, or even causes sickness to accomplish His sovereign purposes. While sickness is not directly addressed in the passage, Hebrews 12:5-11 describes God disciplining us to "produce a harvest of righteousness" (verse 11). **Sickness can be a means of God's loving discipline**. It is difficult for us to comprehend why God would work in this manner. But, believing in the sovereignty of God, there is no other option than suffering being something God allows and/or causes.

The clearest example of this in Scripture is found in Psalm 119. Notice the progression through verses 67, 71, and 75 - "Before I was afflicted I went astray, but now I obey your word...**It was good for me to be afflicted so that I might learn your decrees...I know, O LORD, that your laws are righteous, and in faithfulness you have afflicted me**." The author of Psalm 119 was looking at suffering from God's perspective. It was good for him to be afflicted. *It was faithfulness that caused God to afflict him*. The result of the affliction was so that he could learn God's decrees and obey His Word.

You can live any nasty way you want and still claim the promises. I am bothered by that. However I again would suggest you read "The Real Faith for Healing" by Charles Price. This is very old book so don't associate it with the man's picture that comes up on this site. The one who wrote this book was an old man.

His teaching was that we seek the healer, not the healing. This sets right with me because the woman with the issue of blood said it she could but touch the hem of His garment she would be healed. According to your faith be it unto you.

Now I know again the quote will be Paul accepting his thorn in the flesh. I say if God comes to you and tells you He wants to leave you the way you are after fully seeking Him then receive it and His grace will be sufficient for you and me. I have read Joni Erickson's testimony myself and God told her He was leaving her unhealed for a reason, so she accepted it. However until God tells me different I will take Him at His word "sozo" and press in to touch the hem of His garment.

I think part of the hinderence to healing, please note I said part, is that we don't press into God we press into healing. When we live in the light of His presence He life eradicates our infirmities, unless He has told us differently. The trouble is we don't dwell in His presence. We make little side excursions when we have time, but our other "priorities" take the central throne in our hearts. I guarantee that when Moses and Jesus came down the mountain from the presence of God no infirmities were present in their bodies. Yes God did allow some to keep certain things either to keep them humble or as a reminder. I will accept that if I ever get to the place they did. Until then I will press into to God. I will search for intimacy with Him and know that His light will dispel any darkness that is in my life, including sickness. I have seen it happen time and again.

I take exception to the notion that people get sick because they lacked faith. The enemy of our souls puts sickness on us like he did Job, however God healed Job. I can tell you of times in my business when one of my employees comes up to me and says I have strep I need to be off work and immediately my throat begins to hurt. I say devil you are a liar. That sickness can't come on me that fast. I say Jesus made provision for me by His stripes and I stand on Your word Lord. And just as fast as the symptom came it leaves. I have walked in God's word for healing for over thirty years and it is true. Have I never struggled, yes, but that doesn't change the word of God. When I touch Him I receive His healing.

If we would spend as much time on our faces worshipping Him and basking in His presence as we do on these computers we would experience that glory and would walk in more of the provision than we do. I am certain of it.

Last but not least, last night I went to hear missionary Heidi Baker speak. It was wonderful to hear someone speak who attributes everything to intimacy with God. Their ministry is seeing healing, deaf, blind, dead raised, etc. Mark 16 stuff. Why?, because Heidi learned the secret that she could accomplish more in one minute after being in His presence "intimacy" than she could have in thirty years of working without it.

My pastor said " These signs will follow those who believe they will follow".

I can attest they do. At work I lay hands on the sick and "many" recover. Do all? I don't know, I do know that a number come back and tell me they were well, even of cancer.

I will do and believe the word. If God tells me for whatever reason He wants to leave me or someone sick and I'm sure it's Him then OK, but until then I am sozo'd

I just wanted people to read what Goldminer posted...again.

Ben, you have been taking some heat and I respect your ambition for trying to balance it all. However, trying to balance too many things at once, always leads to disaster. Like I said before, you are intelligent and I hope that you keep the love you have for Him. I also mentioned your attitude, not your pride.

I cannot help but think of Jesus when he went into the temple and turned over tables and healed the sick and the lame. Ben, it seems you are trying to be Jesus in this situation (thread), but you are failing to realize that Jesus is with us and we are all trying to listen to Him (but there seems to be a lot of noise coming in through the door). **You are welcome in side, but be careful not to knock over Jesus' table**

Other than that...

I believe and I will suffer. I believe and I will be healed. I believe and I will trust Him whose ways and times are much different and higher than my own.

If all 'true' believing Christians were to be perfectly healed of suffering, including disease, this would be Heaven. I have news for some of you...this is not Heaven!

This thread has gone on long enough for me. God does heal. We will not understand this, no matter how much we 'talk' about it. We are to praise him, rejoicing that He is Him, who created everything.

In Heaven, we will all see, hear, walk, dance, and sing. We will be able to do everything, in God's will, in God's time. In the meantime, love one another. To the best of our ability, love.

My singing is not too good now, but I bet'cha it will be much sweeter in Heaven!

Having been through illness, and experiencing it in my family, I can honestly say that we just can't put these things into boxes. God is outside of the box. For me, it was when I was very ill, and certain that I was a dismal failure (as far as bei

ng a testimony) that non-Christians saw and expressed the power of God through me and my faith.

For several years, for reasons that I gradually became aware of, illness WAS the BEST for me. God was building my faith in him. Then there came a time when God decided that health was the best for me. He healed me, miraculously.

I still believe that nobody has been nearly as moved BECAUSE of my healing, as they were through my weakness. And even now, it is not my strengths that touch people, but my own neediness, knowing that I walk the same vulnerable path that they do.

Even Paul recognized the value of weakness in himself.

We must always see others through God's eyes, not through the eyes of our ideal expectations - of where we believe that others AUGHT to be at ex: ideal health, ideal faith or whatever. In fact, such lofty expectations put a terrible strain on the afflicted ones - even if they are not expressed out loud. I can remember being in the presence of those who thought or said that if I did something different, was less self-absorbed, had more faith, blah blah blah, then I should be healed. I was sensitive to their hidden thoughts, and trust me, their unspoken thoughts just made me feel sicker and more condemned. I was hard enough on myself, without being subjected to such burdens by well-meaning friends.

Mind you, through it all I learned that the only opinion that counted was God's. I needed to learn that he loved me dearly, just the way I was, and was indeed working in my life.

None of us lives out the ideal faith ourselves. So why should we be judging others by a standard that we cannot maintain!!

Something else to think about:

Don't you wonder why Paul, who wrote such glorious words about standing strong in Christ, having victory in him, being free from the lion's mouth, etc was not freed from his chains - and even died in them?

I phoned a well- respected semi-retired Christian child psychiatrist who lived 12 hours drive away. He seemed so perfect for our situation. And I really wanted a Christian. He said, "Get a doctor nearer, right away! (this was serious) YOU are the one with the faith, and YOUR faith is what's important in this situation.

Indeed, there are times when those who too ill and emotionally weak simply CANNOT take on faith. And that is when we "bear one another's burdens", and we exercise faith on their behalf.

And, isn't that just where prayer often takes us. God calls us to be involved in the very ones whom we pray for - to help lighten the load that they are collapsing under.

So I'm sorry that I got under everyone's skin on this topic.

If anyone has anything left to say on this thread, I will only respond to it if it contains scripture. And if it does not address my challenge to prove by the life of Christ that His will was ever anything other than to heal everyone, then I don't think I will respond to it.

I have made this challenge for the fifth or sixth time now, and no one has offered any biblical evidence for their theory. Other than what I have said here, I am done with this thread, unless someone will address this issue.

I will no longer comment on subjective material for this thread, as that is pretty much the only thing that anyone has offered so far.

Hi Ben,

I haven't been following all your discussion in the three threads which are in progress on healing, but I want to encourage you that I do know what you're saying about Christ's willingness to heal, because of my own revelation from Him on this point.

However, I want to say two very clear things. One is that timing is everything. The people Jesus healed, for the most part, had gone looking for Him, and the same applied to the twelve and the seventy. There was to be no forcing of God's grace on anybody, and those rejecting it, were effectively excluding themselves from the benefits of trusting Him.

In the passing, I also believe healing is for non-Christians. This is the group of whom Jesus healed the most. The idea that one has to have made a *commitment* to Christ for salvation, has crept into churches, but I don't find it in scripture.

The other thing I want to say is about faith. I was greatly moved by a sermon I heard once, on Mark 11:22, where Jesus tells the disciples 'Have faith in God'. The speaker re-interpreted this to read 'Hold the faithfulness of God'. This, I found immensely helpful for several years after, as I had a big problem trusting any of my own judgment - which meant that I was a sitting duck for the enemy, because I couldn't trust that my faith was trustworthy, either. I know this is a bit of a mental double-cross, (and there is a specific reason I was trapped in this mindset,) but I'm not any more, because the Lord used that sermon to save me out of it.

Therefore, I want to add this to your arsenal... that healing may not depend on either your faith, or the faith of the person seeking healing, but on His faith, and on your being at complete rest in your trust of His word to you. The thing for you, then, is to know you are praying in *His* will and *His* timing. Which is not to say that the faith He has been nurturing in you is unreliable, but simply that there is a fine dividing line between *depending* on Him, and being edged over to feel as if you are personally responsible when a person is not healed.

Jesus said 'whosoever will may come and drink of the waters of life freely' but many are put off on the journey, or, should I say *by* the journey.

This is not my full reply, but it is something for you to think about, especially with regard to those who have been chronically ill. The illness becomes part of their identity. They may have trouble parting with aspects of that identity - parting with their neediness. In these cases, there has to be a willingness to repent of not being willing to be changed, to repent of wanting to keep the pain.

This may be unthinkable to you, but to them, it makes a lot more sense than being healed.

One of the reasons I'm *keen* on healing, is that it gives a person an encounter with Jesus, maybe our Father, and with the power of prayer and also, faith. Even if only this once, they come to Jesus in need, and go away changed. While many may never return to even thank Him, for some, it is an opening to another way of living. But, to make the transition from sick worldling to whole saint, may be a matter of several steps for them - maybe even to take years not seconds.

While sickness may well be associated with sin, it may also be associated with sins *against* the person. All you can do is pray as God leads you, and trust Him to help that person through the need of their moment. Some healing is so psychologically deep in its meaning, that it takes literal time - days, maybe weeks - for a person to take stock of all God has done for them.

Be patient with people, and trust God to use you how He pleases. I'm sure you don't have this urgency simply from your own self. But as you walk with God through each opportunity to pray for someone, He will be teaching you more and more how to be most useful to Him, so that each person's faith is built up, and you yourself are not dismayed or confounded by His answers.

I can understand it only too well (been there).

One reason is, as Dorcas said, that long-term sickness can become "part of" the person. Another reason is that if you are sick no-one can demand you to do anything you don't feel like doing! You have less responsibility, fewer demands on you. People make allowances and don't expect too much.

A sick person also gets more attention and sympathy.

Even the symptoms of a common cold may be exaggerated, either to get attention, or as an excuse for not putting in one's best work, or going to a party or something you basically don't *want* to do.

Believe me, I've done it!

Remember Jesus asked the man at the pool of Bethesda, "Do you **want** to be healed".

But please don't go accusing anyone who doesn't seem to be healed of not wanting to be - that's nearly as bad as accusing them of unbelief!

Unless of course they do *need* to hear it at that point, and are ready to accept the challenge and repent!

Just remembered a couple of personal examples when I wasn't healed straight away when someone prayed, but something much more than physical healing was done.

One was when I had toothache on the weekend, when you couldn't get a dentist at all. The strongest painkillers available without prescription, didn't seem to touch the pain.

I decided to call on a friend, to ask her to pray for me.

She asked me to have tea with her, but I said I was in too much pain to eat. So she said, "OK, I'll pray for you first, then we'll have tea."

She prayed for me and my *self-pity* vanished instantly!

I still had toothache (eventually had to have that tooth out), but happily munched my way through a salad (carefully chewing on the good side!) and was even able to sleep that night.

The other example was having a cough that just wouldn't go away. Again I felt very sorry for myself, and asked friends to pray for me. I knew the Lord was saying "you are healed", yet I was still coughing as bad as ever.

The next morning I woke up like a lark instead of dragging myself out of bed late because of "not feeling well".

The cough took another couple of weeks to completely disappear, but it didn't matter any more.

I asked the two brothers who had prayed for me because it just didn't make sense. One very wise man explained that the Enemy tries all ways to spoil the relationship between us and the Lord. Sometimes he uses sickness.

Healing *begins* with restoring that relationship with the Lord. Often it spills out into the body and results in physical healing, but not always (here you will disagree, Ben). But its restoring of spiritual fellowship that is the *really* important part of healing.

Good morning, Ben :-)

Thanks for answering my thoughts so far.

Here are scriptures that back up my suggestion of asking the Lord first what to pray for a person, before telling them what you expect the Lord to do.

John 5:19 - 21

Then answered Jesus and said unto them, Verily, verily, I say unto you, The Son can do nothing of himself, but what he seeth the Father do: for what things soever he doeth, these also doeth the Son likewise. For the Father loveth the Son, and sheweth him all things that himself doeth: and he will shew him greater works than these, that ye may marvel. For as the Father raiseth up the dead, and quickeneth; even so the Son quickeneth whom he will.

John 12:49, 50

For I have not spoken of myself; but the Father which sent me, he gave me a commandment, what I should say, and what I should speak. And I know that his commandment is life everlasting: whatsoever I speak therefore, even as the Father

r said unto me, so I speak.

John 7:17, 18 If any man will do his will, he shall know of the doctrine, whether it be of God, or I speak of myself. He that speaketh of himself seeketh his own glory: but he that seeketh his glory that sent him, the same is true, and no unrighteousness is in him.

Ben, there are a few more like these, but the message is clear, I believe, that Jesus waited on His Father for each healing and miracle.

I believe the basis of the healing 'word' is the prophetic word, although I'd never seen it so clearly until I posted in a recent thread on the subject.

Don't mix this up with a 'word of prophecy' to the church, though... that's not what I mean.

I mean simply that one receives from God the knowledge of what He wants to do for a person, and then one prays for that - nothing more (or less - still takes faith!) and rests in Him to bring it to pass in due time.

I sometimes tell people to give a prayer three days (in the tomb) to bring forth a tangible result in their experience. This helps both me and the other person, to wait in expectation. But often, the Lord makes the answer palpable sooner.

In a different thread, The Spirit of Prophecy which KingJimmy started in the Lounge, philologos makes the point that to be able to testify to Jesus, one has to have seen or heard Him.

I believe this is why one should wait on Him, before passing the word on to the person for whom you are going to pray. You may be led *not* to pass on that word, but, it will have made all the difference to how you prayed and what you are expecting the Lord to do.

In response to what you said in your last post let me say this:

I try my best to wait upon the Lord, but I believe there are occasions where the Lord will not tell us which one of the forty people to pray for first in a service.

You see its kinda like this: If you are a parent, once you teach your child how to do something the right way, (the way you would do it) you don't want to tell them each time they do it how it needs to be done, you expect that they will be mature and take care of it just fine, and then as they mature even more, they will do it without even being told. It becomes a relationship of trust, rather than one of always being told what to do.

For further example, the Lord doesn't come tell you how to tell the truth anymore, because He has already taught you how. So you walk in authority in that area. I hope this is clear what I'm trying to say.

So in those situations where forty people need healing, want healing, I believe we should be as sensitive as possible to the Spirit, but I have been in those situations enough to know that the Lord does not always tell me what to do. He waits to see what I will do because He has already instructed me beforehand.

A well documented example would be of Smith Wigglesworth. (I know his stuff pretty well, so I generally use him a lot.) He used to say that "if he came into a meeting, and the Spirit wasn't doing anything, he would preach louder, and if the Spirit still wasn't doing anything he would start yelling, and he said he would keep at that until the Spirit started moving."

Not that we need to all start yelling until something happens, the point is that the Spirit was waiting on Smith to do something, and **I believe that one of the main reasons that we do not see more power in the church is because we are waiting on the Spirit, and the Spirit is waiting on us.** So I believe it is an absolute necessity that we act, and when we do, the Lord will back it up with power.

In the scriptures, you don't see where the disciples saw a lame man, and then they stopped, prayed to the Lord for guidance about how to pray for the lame man, and then approached him and prayed. I believe that is because they simply acted, they already knew the will of God concerning healing. So they were always ready.

philologos would put it slightly differently... something a bit more like 'a right response to revelation'.

What I was trying to communicate in my previous post, is the concept that Jesus Himself waited for revelation from the Father before acting. Then, in faith, He acted or spoke (or both).

Truly, I believe this takes all the guesswork out of praying for other people. I believe it is scriptural, and a far greater discipline than hoping for the best, without a single hint from God of what He actually wants you (or me) to pray.

It can also be, sometimes, that one starts out praying as the Spirit leads, and ends up somewhere unexpected.... right in the middle of one's prayer God is challenging one to believe into a much bigger 'word' than one had in mind when one enthusiastically encouraged another soul to invite God to do something vital for them. It really is an 'open your mouth and I will fill it' situation (in those cases).

Actually, I think this really challenges the flesh and the mind of the flesh, because sometimes we have our own agenda and dearly want God to bless it, when really, God has His own agenda, and dearly wants us to be quiet and tune into it. This takes the guesswork out of 'faith'.

As one dear saint quipped 'I was quite willing to compromise, but God wanted everything His own way!' We do well to take this seriously, because He is going to *get* everything His own way....

Do you see the distinction I'm making?

My friend and prayer partner has a son who had advanced cancer. He doesn't have it any more, the Lord healed him. The Lord promised that he would be healed, both through Scripture and prophetic words.

Her sister died this morning, of another form of cancer.

We had hoped there would be a word of healing for her too, but instead the Lord gave us various scriptures, including Isaiah 40:5*The glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it...*" and Psalm 78:

...4 *We will not hide them from their children,
Telling to the generation to come the praises of the Lord,
And His strength and His wonderful works that He has done.*
5 *For He established a testimony in Jacob,
And appointed a law in Israel,
Which He commanded our fathers,
That they should make them known to their children;
6 That the generation to come might know them,
The children who would be born,
That they may arise and declare them to their children,
7 That they may set their hope in God,
And not forget the works of God,
But keep His commandments;...*

The latter passage made us truly hope that she would be healed - for how else could she see her children and grandchildren saved?

Yet the Word and the promise of the Lord stands sure. And He said that it would be to His glory and to the salvation of her family (my friend led her to the Lord a few months ago, so there's no fear or sorrow for her, however great the loss and grief for those left behind)

Why wasn't she healed? We had faith, and the Lord had already healed her nephew, so we had evidence of His power also.

We even wondered if He might raise her from the dead, but yesterday He gave a word that we were not to be presumptuous or demand that He would do what we thought He should do.

Ben, I'm so glad you have started asking these questions. The Lord has already honoured your faith that He will heal; now you are going deeper. I agree with you that it is good to hope or even *expect* the Lord to heal - why shouldn't a loving Lord do so? It is only when the expected or hoped for thing doesn't happen that we have to do much heart searching, and maybe conclude in the end that $A + B$ doesn't *always* = C

'If God speaks in a general way rather than a specific way.'

People were never 'general' to Jesus. Each one was addressed individually. He never just raised His hand over a multitude, and healed them all at once. I believe this is something to do with God's desire to communicate with the individuals who approach Him for healing. So, if you have only a general feeling of God's presence to heal, I would find different ways to become more sensitive to His guidance, so I was lead round the crowd in the order HE led me.

'And remains silent when we press Him for specifics, what do you do? '

I believe you wait. Most people in the situation of being at such a meeting, have been ill or unwell historically. If they were an emergency, they would be (usually) in hospital. So, you have more opportunity to mess up the dealing God has in store for them by praying out of the Spirit, than honestly telling an individual the Lord has shown you nothing. At this point, you can turn the problem on to the petitioner, by asking how the Lord has been speaking to them in the past. Sometimes, once you get more perspective on God's dealings with the person, to date, you can sense whether a leap of faith or simply another step, is required of them.'

'Do you go away and fast for a while until He answers?'

If that's what He puts in your heart, especially if for someone in your home church or one you know well, then do you have an option *not* to fast? It may be relevant to a deliverance, or, the Lord will give you His word when the timing is right for the whole church.

'Or do you step out on the general leading you feel, and just begin to pray for the people?'

Of course you can pray with people, that they should be blessed. That never harms (as someone once said to me). But don't take all the responsibility on your own shoulders. Let others also pray with you, and let the person seeking healing or whatever blessing, also put something into words to God, so that the outcome is something *they* have committed themselves to receive.

Now, allow the Lord to tune your ear more finely to His words. He is always speaking and it is easy to feel pressurised to perform in that sort of group situation. But, I'm sure His aim is to lead you towards being confident, every time you pray, that you are praying in His will, and according to His word. That is scriptural and if you already do it, there is no need to depart from this Christ-like practice.

I think this feeling is real, yet, but not necessarily something to detain or deter you. It may even be a lie, designed to draw you off your prey.

You're treading on enemy territory with your attitude, and while there will always be refinements you can make, remember this work for the Lord is primarily a service to Him, and in His stead. It is not about a formula other than we have discussed, or about forcing people who are not yet ready, to open themselves to exorcism or some kind of healing which would make a good headline, but doesn't make them feel bothered with at the level of their inner being. Often that's where their 'pain' really is, and dealing with the outward manifestation of it requires patience. Unless the Lord gives you a clear lead toward a much bigger event in the Spirit.
