Before what I consider my conversion, I attended a bible college in Southern California. In fact, I went on staff for two years as the resident pool/water feature guy.

A few years before I came, I think they required women to wear shorts and t-shirts over their one-piece suits. By the time I got there, in 2002, they had just begun allowing women to wear "modest" two pieces without coverings. (No two-piece is modest, and, in my opinion, a one-piece is only as modest as that woman is unattractive.) By the time I left in 2005, girls at this bible college were not only wearing the scantest of two pieces but stalked about the campus in next to nothing as well. If a typical swimsuit isn't immodest, what is? What does it say of bible education coming from men who can't realize this and do something about it?

In late 2005, when I came to Christ, I was dumbfounded that this was allowed to go on. They call it "liberty", but I know for a fact, having been a student and staff member, that most men on campus complained to one another about "struggling with lust". Not badly enough to picket the pool!

I'm not out to point fingers. I was with them and I wasn't complaining about anything but the guilt and shame.

My candid request to any woman reading this, and to those men who have influence upon the women they know, is for women to seriously consider abstinence from form-fitting swimsuits unless you're certain you are unattractive. Even then, wearing one promotes the license of others who are. Recommendation: if you want to swim, wear a loose shirt, wear some long-ish board shorts. Better yet, swim with women. That's how it used to be until culture caved to the pressure and temptation.

Finally, some verses for your consideration.

"As a jewel of gold in a swine's snout, so is a beautiful woman without discretion."

"that women adorn themselves in respectable apparel, with modesty and self-control; not with finely-braided hair, or gold, or pearls, or costly attire; But (which is appropriate to women professing godliness) with good works."

"Do not let your adorning be external—the braiding of hair and the putting on of gold jewelry, or the clothing you wear—but let your adorning be the hidden person of the heart with the imperishable beauty of a gentle and quiet spirit, which in God's sight is very precious."

Note in this next verse the connection that is made between the uncovering of the legs and nakedness. This is to be a disgrace, not because the human form is itself shameful, but because it should not be used in ways tending necessarily to sin, and which defy the post-fall meaning of clothing.

"Take the millstones and grind flour,
put off your veil,
strip off your robe, uncover your legs,
pass through the rivers.
Your nakedness shall be uncovered,
and your disgrace shall be seen."

Now here's an interesting observation, for whatever it's worth. Following the fall into sin, Adam and Eve make loincloths, presumably covering an area similar to typical bathing suits. God does not leave them in this condition, but gives them more thorough coverings.

"Then the eyes of both were opened, and they knew that they were naked. And they sewed fig leaves together and made themselves loincloths." ... "And the LORD God made for Adam and for his wife garments of skins and clothed them."

Note Matthew Henry's commentary on this passage,

Observe, 1. That clothes came in with sin. We should have had no occasion for them, either for defence or decency, if sin had not made us naked, to our shame. Little reason therefore we have to be proud of our clothes, which are but the badges of our poverty and infamy. 2. That when God made clothes for our first parents he made them warm and strong,

but coarse and very plain: not robes of scarlet, but coats of skin. Their clothes were made, not of silk and satin, but plain skins; not trimmed, nor embroidered, none of the ornaments which the daughters of Sion afterwards invented, and pride themselves in. Let the poor, that are meanly clad, learn hence not to complain: having food and a covering, let them be content; they are as well done to as Adam and Eve were. And let the rich, that are finely clad, learn hence not to make the putting on of apparel their adorning, 1 Pt. 3:3. 3. That God is to be acknowledged with thankfulness, not only in giving us food, but in giving us clothes also, ch. 28:20. The wool and the flax are his, as well as the corn and the wine, Hos. 2:9. 4. These coats of skin had a significancy. The beasts whose skins they were must be slain, slain before their eyes, to show them what death is, and (as it is Eccl. 3:18) that they may see that they themselves were beasts, mortal and dying. It is supposed that they were slain, not for food, but for sacrifice, to typify the great sacrifice, which, in the latter end of the world, should be offered once for all. Thus the first thing that died was a sacrifice, or Christ in a figure, who is therefore said to be the Lamb slain from the foundation of the world. These sacrifices were divided between God and man, in token of reconciliation: the flesh was offered to God, a whole burnt-offering; the skins were given to man for clothing, signifying that, Jesus Christ having offered himself to God a sacrifice of a sweet-smelling savour, we are to clothe ourselves with his righteousness as with a garment, that the shame of our nakedness may not appear. Adam and Eve made for themselves aprons of fig-leaves, a covering too narrow for them to wrap themselves in, Isa. 28:20. Such are all the rags of our own righteousness. But God made them coats of skins; large, and strong, and durable, and fit for them; such is the righteousness of Christ. Therefore put on the Lord Jesus Christ.

Before what I consider my conversion, I attended a bible college in Southern California. In fact, I went on staff for two years as the resident pool/water feature guy.

A few years before I came, I think they required women to wear shorts and t-shirts over their one-piece suits. By the time I got there, in 2002, they had just begun allowing women to wear "modest" two pieces without coverings. (No two-piece is modest, and, in my opinion, a one-piece is only as modest as that woman is unattractive.) By the time I left in 2005, girls at this bible college were not only wearing the scantest of two pieces but stalked about the campus in next to nothing as well. If a typical swimsuit isn't immodest, what is? What does it say of bible education coming from men who can't realize this and do something about it?

In late 2005, when I came to Christ, I was dumbfounded that this was allowed to go on. They call it "liberty", but I know for a fact, having been a student and staff member, that most men on campus complained to one another about "struggling with lust". Not badly enough to picket the pool!

I'm not out to point fingers. I was with them and I wasn't complaining about anything but the guilt and shame.

My candid request to any woman reading this, and to those men who have influence upon the women they know, is for women to seriously consider a fastidiousness from form-fitting swimsuits unless you're certain you are unattractive. Even then, wearing one promotes the license of others who are. Recommendation: if you want to swim, wear a loose shirt, wear some long-ish board shorts. Better yet, swim with women. That's how it used to be until culture caved to the pressure and temptation.

Finally, some verses for your consideration.

"As a jewel of gold in a swine's snout, so is a beautiful woman without discretion."

"that women adorn themselves in respectable apparel, with modesty and self-control; not with finely-braided hair, or gold, or pearls, or costly attire; But that (which is appropriate to women professing godliness) with good works."

"Do not let your adorning be external—the braiding of hair and the putting on of gold jewelry, or the clothing you wear—but let your adorning be the hidden person of the heart with the imperishable beauty of a gentle and quiet spirit, which in God's sight is very precious."

Note in this next verse the connection that is made between the uncovering of the legs and nakedness. This is to be a disgrace, not because the human form is itself shameful, but because it should not be used in ways tending necessarily to sin, and which defy the post-fall meaning of clothing.

"Take the millstones and grind flour,
put off your veil,
strip off your robe, uncover your legs,
pass through the rivers.
Your nakedness shall be uncovered,
and your disgrace shall be seen."

Now here's an interesting observation, for whatever it's worth. Following the fall into sin, Adam and Eve make loincloths, presumably covering an area similar to typical bathing suits. God does not leave them in this condition, but gives them more thorough coverings.

"Then the eyes of both were opened, and they knew that they were naked. And they sewed fig leaves together and made themselves loincloths." ... "And the LORD God made for Adam and for his wife garments of skins and clothed them."

Note Matthew Henry's commentary on this passage,

Observe, 1. That clothes came in with sin. We should have had no occasion for them, either for defence or decency, if sin had not made us naked, to our shame. Little reason therefore we have to be proud of our clothes, which are but the badges of our poverty and infamy. 2. That when God made clothes for our first parents he made them warm and strong, but coarse and very plain: not robes of scarlet, but coats of skin. Their clothes were made, not of silk and satin, but plain skins; not trimmed, nor embroidered, none of the ornaments which the daughters of Sion afterwards invented, and pride themselves in. Let the poor, that are meanly clad, learn hence not to complain: having food and a covering, let them be content; they are as well done to as Adam and Eve were. And let the rich, that are finely clad, learn hence not to make the putting on of apparel their adorning, 1 Pt. 3:3. 3. That God is to be acknowledged with thankfulness, not only in giving us food, but in giving us clothes also, ch. 28:20. The wool and the flax are his, as well as the corn and the wine, Hos. 2:9. 4. These coats of skin had a significancy. The beasts whose skins they were must be slain, slain before their eyes, to show them what death is, and (as it is Eccl. 3:18) that they may see that they themselves were beasts, mortal and dying. It is supposed that they were slain, not for food, but for sacrifice, to typify the great sacrifice, which, in the latter end of the world, should be offered once for all. Thus the first thing that died was a sacrifice, or Christ in a figure, who is therefore said to be the Lamb slain from the foundation of the world. These sacrifices were divided between God and man, in token of reconciliation: the flesh was offered to God, a whole burnt-offering; the skins were given to man for clothing, signifying that, Jesus Christ having offered himself to God a sacrifice of a sweet-smelling savour, we are to clothe ourselves with his righteousness as with a garment, that the shame of our nakedness may not appear. Adam and Eve made for themselves aprons of fig-leaves, a covering too narrow for them to wrap themselves in, Isa. 28:20. Such are all the rags of our own righteousness. But God made them coats of skins; large, and strong, and durable, and a fit for them; such is the righteousness of Christ. Therefore put on the Lord Jesus Christ.

Legalism can raise its head in the areas of clothing, music, hairstyles, and the use of cosmetics. Legalism comes into play when we decide that our standard in these areas is the correct standard and demand that everyone else abide by our standard, looking down on them or even considering them unspiritual if they do not.

Liberalism can also raise its head in the areas of clothing, music, hairstyles, and the use of cosmetics. Liberalism comes into play when we decide that there is no real standard and if anyone says anything different then they don't understand God's grace and are missing the mark.

Heb 8:10 For this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel After those days, saith the Lord; I will put my laws into their mind, And on their heart also will I write them: And I will be to them a God, And they shall be to me a people

If you are truly born again you will know God's laws. You will know what is right and what is wrong. You will not need anyone to tell you to dress this or that way your heart will guide you in way you should dress.

Let's be an encouragement and help to our brothers! :) Letter down below....

Girls, could we talk to you right out of our hearts for a few minutes? It is awkward for us to talk about something of this nature, in person,

so we thought we would write our feelings.

We are young men who have been saved. We desperately want to live for Christ and not follow the ways of the world. We feel in our hearts that we should live "holy" lives. After all, our

bodies are the temple, the sanctuary, the place where the "Holy" Spirit lives and makes His home.

We know that guys and girls are affected differently, so since we desperately want to follow hard after God, could we kindly and respectfully ask you to help us with a few things? We realize that girls are primarily stimulated or turned on by "touch."

Did you know that guys are turned on by "sight?" So when you are "aroused" (sexually awakened) by a guy's "touch," we are in the same

way aroused by mere "sight." Let us explain. When we see girls who are dressed in a suggestive, revealing, provocative, teasing, tantalizing

manner, our sexual desires are aroused. Our bodies are then affected. To be absolutely candid, let us give you some examples of what we are

referring to. If you are wearing a blouse that barely meets the waist of your slacks and some of your skin shows while you are moving around, or simply while you are walking, sitting, or kneeling, our minds are

geared to wonder what more of your body would look like further up.... This causes our bodies to respond biologically, and suddenly we

are fighting a war in our minds and bodies. And that war of lust is continuing often long, even hours, after you are gone.

We hate this, because our "righteous man" wants to think pure thoughts....

When you wear low-cut tops which are in any degree revealing, or when you bend over, and they are revealing, this again causes us big problems in the flesh. The Spirit and the flesh begin to fight again. What we are trying to say is this: If it is not for sale, don't

advertise it. We really feel that the still small voice of the Holy Spirit speaks to you and nudges you when it is too tight, too short, too low, or too revealing. Will you listen to that voice? For the Scripture says, "Quench not the Spirit." (1 Thess. 5:19)

Girls, do you know what we would really like? We would like to come among our Christian sisters and not have to fight a hard struggle in the flesh. We do not need to have to wrestle in the flesh at church or at church activities. We men, whether young, old, single or married, are

faced with this every day among girls of the "world." But we would like to have rest in our Spirit man when we come among Christian girls.

After all, doesn't the Scripture tell us to "come out from among the world and be you separate, saith the Lord." (2 Cor. 6:17) It also tells

us that "all that is in the world, the lust of the eye, and the lust of the flesh, is not of the Father, but is of the world." (1 John 2:15) We are the church, not the world.

We know that people often use the verse, "Man looketh on the outward appearance, but God looketh on the heart," (1 Sam. 16:7) to condone

anything they wish to wear. This is one of the most misused/used out-of-context verses in the Bible. Conversely, the fact is, if your heart is pure, your outward appearance will be modest....

Girls can be fashionable and modest at the same time. To be honest, we respect you more when your appearance is modest, as the Scripture commands in 1 Timothy 2:9. We really do not want the kind of girl who dresses provocatively, for we know that if we marry her, she will still be that way in the presence of other men once we are married.

We know that we have Christian responsibilities toward girls, too. We must be careful to portray ourselves properly. We must treat you like ladies. If we are really committed Christian guys, we will strive to treat you like Jesus would. After all, you are daughters of God.

Thank you, dear Christian sisters, for hearing our hearts on this subject. Once we have conveyed the truth of the matter to you, you become responsible before God for what you do with the truth. We really are "our brother's keeper." (Genesis 4:9.) We know that there is a

"cult of conformity" in our generation, but we as Christians "march to the beat of a different drummer." Please, girls, do not say, "I don't care," but help us in these last days to live as close to Jesus as we can. Thank you so much.

When we attended a denominational church that had many of these types of young girls my daughter sewed her own clothes, dresses, and wore a head covering.

Since I don't sew much, and have never worn a head covering I wondered where it came from. She told me, "Mom, if I don't dress like this, I'll have to wear spaghetti straps and a tight skirt".

Of course we stood with her. Once in the young people's Sunday School class the youth leaders wife asked the question to all that were there: "Who would you rather be approached and witnessed to by: this girl with the dress and a head covering; or this girl with modern, skimpy clothes?"

Oddly, almost every single guy in the class said my daughter; and almost every single girl said the other girl wearing modern clothes.

Girls have a lot of competition, acceptance issues and pressures on every hand to conform to modern day "fashion".

My guess is, that if you had given her a blanket, she probably would have just gotten embarrassed but not changed her style of dress.

(How well do you know her grandparents? Could you gracefully approach them?)

Strangely, the same Sunday school teacher who asked the question with my daughter in it, I had personally seen come up to the balcony and tell girls on the front to sit in a lady like fashion, as the ministers could see her underwear... on more than one occasion, and pretty much on every front row...

Yet, I can't help but wonder what older woman, one she would listen to, could approach her and let her know that God loves modesty?

That doesn't mean she has to wear a certain "style" of bibbed dress with 10 pleats in the front and back that reaches to her mid calf; but a modest style, one that is befitting a young woman representing godliness.

It is a quandry I have thought about often.

I pray that God would help all of us who are "older", have the grace, love and wisdom to teach these young women some discretion.

Yes, it does; but it is only the beginning of a life of obedience that must be learned, and surrendered to.

The kind of life of surrender that is willing to *...take wrong.. suffer yourselves to be defrauded...;*

to walk not as other Gentiles walk, in the vanity of their mind;

*Let no corrupt communication proceed out of your mouth, but that **which is good for the use of edifying, that it may minister grace unto the hearers;***

While putting away those things humanity wrestles with like bitterness, clamour, ALL malice and of course wrath and anger; the more difficult in the experience of walking in this life is often more:

be ye kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake has forgiven you.

Far too often within churches there is a "putting up with each other" more than there is a tenderheartedness. Far too many hold onto an anger about what someone said or did to them, even when they say 'oh, I've forgiven all that'; it does not take much rubbing up against to see it come out... quite unlike God did for Christ sake towards us.

Not to mention the covetousness of a lifestyle full of bread and idleness of time;

a lack of true fellowship that encourages honesty, love, and accountability;

the great hinderance of just being too busy to keep our minds on those things which are above;

the lack of brokenheartedness before God for our pride, our selfishness, our pharisaical attitudes, our desire for the acceptance of men rather than the countenance of God shining on us.

I am not necessarily the best witness, the most perfect testimony, the most quiet or gentle, I have stuck my foot in my mouth so many times it's amazing I don't have athlete's tongue.

I only have 1 thing going for me: Christ loves me and He gave Himself for me, and HE loves me enough to show me who I really am;

and throughout this path I am learning to recognize my absolute utter inability to DO anything but pursue Him.

When I look my own fruits vs. the works of the flesh, sometimes I cringe; then the Lord draws me to a place of... I don't know a word for it... looking in the mirror- seeing Christ and His sacrifice on the behalf of every living soul-and my greatest enemy- me.

One time during a church service I went downstairs to the restroom and inside was a younger lady, whom I did not know, who decided to talk to me. She told me her testimony, how she had been saved out of the JW's, how she worked in a highly male area and how God had convicted her of her clothing and how she decided that she would rather make Jesus the Lord happy than to manipulate men. This single mother was only a couple of years old, in the Lord.

I try to be sensitive to the Holy Spirit in regards to those things, I know a young lady who would be crushed and feel that I was "judging her" if I were to tell her that she was showing far too much cleavage... so I just pray, and if she does wear something that's more modest I tell her how wonderful she looks. You know, she's not perfect, but she has changed a lot of the clothes she wears and I haven't said a word.

If I were to take a little piggy, clean it up, put proper clothing on it, carry it around with me and treat it as a puppy it might do that for awhile; but sooner or later that piggy is going to see a mud bog and run to it and wallow in the mire, because it's still a pig.

I'm sure you know, but far too many people look on the outward to make their assumptions of what's inside; but the Lord looks on the heart and it's His desire to change 'the heart', to make the person new-born again- renewed in the spirit of their mind- turned from darkness to light- from rebellion to obedience- and from pride to humility. Surely enough,

as you have said, once that heart is changed, there is ample room for the Holy Spirit to convict of anything that is opposite of Christ-likeness.

In my opinion, for whatever that is worth..., the preacher needs to be simply concerned with "what is God's heart" for this moment in time, for this place, for these people... oh, there may certainly be some practicality in those teachings- but there are far too many other more concerning issues at hand.

I've seen too many people that dress in a particular "modest" style to please someone else, some teacher, some group; but on the inside they are still the same, and even more often- they point the finger at those that are not dressed such as themselves and surround themselves only with those who have the same clothes, looking at others in disdain.

Truly, truly, in my heart of hearts, I believe that 2 things would make a difference in the lives of young women, and women in general especially in regards to their "fashion", as well as those "other issues in their hearts":

1. Men who stand in the position of head of household maintaining the standard of the household according to godliness and wisdom. (Now perhaps that would be some wonderful revival teaching!)

2. A fellowship of women, not filled with foolishness! One that is spiritual and practical, women teaching women not simply with words, but with the focus and representation of their lives!

I have grown so weary of the fluff and waste of time that the majority of women's activities are, that unless I feel that God would have me specifically go there, I just won't go.

A couple of years ago I had thought about a plan for a Biblical Women's Meeting. Where children were welcome, grandmothers would help the mothers learn to keep their children quiet, under control and/or occupied- there may even be activities for the children to learn (depending on age) taught by older children (who usually love to be the teachers for smaller children.)

Someplace the practical needs of women both non Christian and Christian were actually addressed. (Not some place where you just try to "sneak" up on non Christian women with some emotional plea; but somewhere they can say- I need childcare I can trust- and the group either finds one or starts one. I have no transportation, finds some or drive them for awhile. A place where experience can help the less experienced!

Where learning the practicality of growing tomatoes, and then canning them is taught. Where mothers can find more than a place of escape from the children, but learn how to order her day a little so she can have a little quiet time of her own at home! Where one might learn to sew, or knit, or bake bread. Where learning to pray for each other, and have genuine concern for each other has the opportunity to be lived out.

Learning to set aside that ridiculous competitive spirit this world absorbs women in; learn to take the little- bitty, sensitive spirit that's always getting their feelings hurt and laying it at the feet of the cross! Give the Lord those words that are UN-Christ-like, that spirit of selfishness and pride, that gossip, that bad attitude towards your husband, that bitterness, that hurt, that improper thought-life, those feelings of confusion and ASK for help! From God, in honesty; and from our "spiritual" mothers in humility; from friends that will do more than "feel your pain"- but actually hold you accountable and help you with an abundance of prayer!

I guess you could say, a spiritual, biblical based, home ec. of sorts.

Yet there needs to be a group of women who have enough sense, enough Jesus Christ, enough leading of the Holy Spirit that can actually reach out to the myriads of women who are being swallowed up in this ghastly time of independence, separation, and the "oppression" mentality!

Women who are properly "under authority", who can express what it means to be "sober, to love their husbands, to love their children, to be discreet, chaste, keepers at home, good, and obedient to their own husbands that the word of God be not blasphemed.."

Even the struggling can be a blessing if what they have learned is to throw off the burdens of this life, the fears of this life, the foolish thinking of this life and to "put on Christ".

But, it wasn't to be... perhaps another time, another place, it's still in my heart and the Lord knows that.

You know, I think we have become so afraid we neglect the sinner, or the churchperson living in sin... For years when I sensed that somehow I felt "threatened" by some other female her looks, her dress, her manner, her eyes- I walked right up to her stuck out my hand and introduced myself; or asked about their well being. Praying the entire time that the Lord would use me! Looking at someone right in the eyes to say, "By the Spirit of God I am NOT afraid!!!" (Not just for them, for me too!)

Prayer is a powerful weapon! "The weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty in God for the pulling down of strongholds." mine, and anyone else's.

In my heart I believe that revival will spark when we: can get past the issues that cause us to shrink back; to neglect the "babies"; to ignore the devastating condition that so many hearts are in; to expect others to minister to the widows and the orphans; can find a way to impart the day to day- moment by moment, practical, spiritual message of the cross; and to have such an intensity of the love of God that it changes how we see everything!

What could be more honoring to God than teaching a young mother how to love her child and to respect her husband! How loving to teach a young woman how to respect the gift God placed on the inside of herself! How Christlike to humble ourselves and wash the feet of these who plod along dirty roads, even if they become angry!

Well, I guess I have fallen under the "using many words" area again! Sorry, for the rambling on..and on.. Thank you for your patience.

The dangers of high heels:

"they can cause foot pain
they can create foot deformities, including hammertoes and bunions
they can cause an unsteady gait
they can shorten the wearer's stride
they can render the wearer unable to run
altered forces at the knee caused by walking in high-heels may predispose to degenerative changes in the knee joint
See "Foot and Tendon Problems" below for many of the medical reasons.
Women who wear high heels frequently have a higher incidence of degenerative joint disease of the knees. This is because they cause a decrease in the normal rotation of the foot which puts more rotation stress on the knee
Podiatrists often comment that 75 percent of their business is caused by females wearing tall high heeled shoes.

High-heeled shoes slant the foot forward and down while bending the toes up. The more that the feet are forced into this position, the more it may cause the Achilles tendon to shorten. This may cause problems when the wearer chooses lower heels or flat-soled shoes. When the foot slants forward, a much greater weight is transferred to the ball of the foot, increasing the likelihood of damage to the underlying soft tissue which supports the foot. In many shoes, style dictates function, either compressing the toes, or forcing them together, possibly resulting in blisters, corns, hammer toes, bunions, and many other medical conditions, most of which are permanent, and will require surgery to alleviate the pain. High heels--because they tip the foot forward-- put pressure on the lower back through making the rump push outwards and crushing the lower back vertebrae and contracting the muscles of the lower back.

If it is not possible to avoid high heels altogether, some doctors suggest that the wearer wear high-heels no more often than twelve hours a day, and that they are spending at least a third of the time on their feet in contour-supportive "flat" shoes (such as exercise sandals), or well-cushioned "sneaker-type" shoes, saving high heels for special occasions.

One of the most critical problems of high-heeled-shoe design involves a properly constructed toe-box. Improper construction here can cause the most damage to one's foot. Toe-boxes which are too narrow force the toes to be "crammed" too close together. Ensuring that room exists for the toes to assume a normal separation so that high-heel wear remains an option rather than a debilitating practice, is an important issue in improving the wearability of women's high-heeled fashion shoes.

Wide heels do not necessarily offer more stability, and any raised heel with too much width, such as found in "blade-" or "block-heeled" shoes, induces unhealthy side-to-side torque to the ankles with every step, stressing them unnecessarily, while creating additional impact on the balls of the feet. Thus, the best design for a high-heel is one with a narrower width, where the heel is closer to the front, more solidly under the ankle, where the toe box provides room enough for the toes, and where forward movement of the foot in the shoe is kept in check by material snug across the instep, rather than by toes jamming together in the toe box.

Interestingly enough, despite the medical issues surrounding high-heel wear, a few podiatrists recommend well-constructed low to moderate heels for some patients. It appears a slight elevation of the heel improves the angle of contact between the metatarsals and the horizontal plane, thereby more closely approximating the proper angle and resulting in proper weight distribution of a medium-to-high-arched foot. Other foot specialists, however, argue that any heel causes unnecessary stresses on the various bones and joints of the foot."

Many women think that an outfit isn't complete without a pair of high-heeled shoes, but that fancy footwear may end up seriously cramping their style. Although heels aren't usually considered particularly comfortable, most women are not aware of the potential dangers. High heels are pumps with heels of more than two inches, according to the American Podiatric Medical Association, who has determined them to be "biomechanically and orthopedically unsound." Aside from damaging a woman's posture and increasing her risk of injury from falling, these shoes actually damage the feet and may result in a lifetime of foot ailments.

Unlike the Barbie dolls they grew up playing with, women have flatter feet designed to bear their weight by distributing it evenly across the entire surface. By placing feet in an uncomfortable position, high heels may lead to a slew of health problems. Pain in the ball of the foot, metatarsalgia, is a common complaint for high heel enthusiasts. But the damage done by heels goes beyond aching feet. High-heeled shoes change the shape of the feet and may eventually prevent them from functioning properly. The unnatural position that the feet and legs are placed in when wearing high heels may shorten the Achilles tendon, which connects the calf muscle to the heel bone. This causes the tendon to become inflamed and irritated. Frequent high heel wearers may also develop a bump at the back of their heel, commonly called a "pump bump," caused by friction between the heel bone and the back of the shoe...."

The first thing you need to do is not fall prey to legalistic teaching, as this will cause you more damage in the long run than actually giving into temptation for a season.

You ask about what to do on a Friday night when your parents aren't home and the temptation arises to go to internet sites you know you shouldn't be on. The answer to this (which is obvious) is to resist the temptation. You are right about it being very frightening. Sometimes the urge can come upon you like an armed man; all it can take is one passing image on television or a billboard or even a Christian magazine and suddenly a strong desire can wage war in your members. You need to understand that this is not sin; this is temptation.

You talk about what to do on a Friday night when this happens. My response is that if you had spent Friday *day* looking to Jesus in fellowship and in the Word, and had you had your quiet time in the morning, that armed man would be kept at bay and his assault foiled before it even begins. Remember, when we walk in the Spirit we automatically mortify the flesh, and you'll find it won't even be a conscious effort on your part. -----Have you reached this state? We will never get to the place where we *cannot* fall again, no preacher of yet has attained (or obtained) this status, and we can begin with the Apostle Paul. He exhorted Timothy to *flee* youthful lusts; you tell us not to, in fact, you would make it seem that the man who physically flees is a servant of sin. This is precisely the kind of ministry that destroys, that heaps heavy condemnation on men and women who struggle against indwelling sin and temptation by making them appear as guilty that they even have these feelings. When the truth is, their lives are an on-going practice of mortification and self-denial which is entirely scriptural.

You are misunderstanding what I am saying didn't I mention lust and that is what they would never fall again into that lust. So the alcoholics I mentioned earlier are Liars when they say they have never fallen into drinking strong drink again and that the very desire has been completely removed from them.

Is there such a life well 1John5v4 tells us that every child of God overcomes the world.

Quote:

-----I ask is that right is this what Jesus died for so we can struggle over sin.

Quote:

-----This is the flaw of your argument, we are not talking about sin; we are talking about temptation. It is scriptural and healthy to resist temptation - especially during seasons where lusts can flare up - and the Bible is laden with exhortation of such, but nowhere will you find the promise that we will attain a state where we *will* not fall or fail God. I thank God for my many failings as a believer and the humility wrought through them.

Paul there you go again I am talking about Lust and Lust is a sin (Matt5v28) not a temptation then you take sin and change it into failings. If your Lusts are flaring up then by the Matt5v28 you are sinning and seems you have succumb to the temptation but God can help you. The following verses should help you understand that Jesus came to set you free from Sin. You don't have to struggle with your Lusts anymore.

Look at the verse below Jesus will save his people from sin.

Matthew 1v21 And she shall bring forth a son, and thou shalt call his name JESUS: for he shall save his people from their sins.

Christ himself said be perfect as your Father in heaven is perfect Matt5v48.

Matt 9v26 But Jesus beheld them, and said unto them, With men this is impossible; but with God all things are possible.

1John 2v1 My little children, these things write I unto you, that ye sin not

I have been thinking about this issue: how does one live victoriously over lust. It has me thinking all day and night. What Lori wrote is right on, in my opinion. What I am going to is not to replace her suggestions but to add to.

When one evaluates temptation, what it is and *why* it tempts us, it should inform us what is the more basic issue at work. Being able to identify this helps a lot. For example, recently something really triggered some very unpleasant responses in me and then I wondered "why does this thing bother me so?" Once I understood the basic forces at work, it was easier to deal with that issue.

Now to answer your question: how does one resist?

One can give you a list of dos and don'ts on how to live victoriously over temptation that will work - for a while, and then it is back to square one, leaving you more defeated than ever before because one will focus on methods and not on a Person. Makes a huge difference - the difference between victory and failure. So what is the solution? I suggest you focus on walking close to the LORD, so close that you really are afraid NOT to because of the damaging results that follow when you don't. Make sense? Allow me to illustrate.

When our only daughter died from a brain tumor, I was devastated. I knew if I would not stay close to the LORD I would go crazy with grief. Another story: One time I had a debilitating sin problem and victory came only when I stormed the gates of heaven for release. So, this is using personal experiences to teach one but what does the scriptures say? Consider Romans 5:20: where sin abounds, grace did much more." (When God gives us instructions on how to live, he always gives one the tools to accomplish it. Always.) The Scriptures do not give us the methods by which God will use to ensure victory, only that victory is there. The LORD may have 1000 ways to accomplish that and you do not know which or what combination he will use, but it is there.

Just go to the gates of heaven and knock, rattle that door - if you will - and persist and He will answer.

Mind if I share one more story? One time I had a client who was a cocaine addict. She wanted release from it. Now at C PC we were not trained to handle drug addicts but we had at our disposal agencies, ministries we could refer our clients to. Anyhow, this girl told me her story: She had been at a rehab, came to the LORD who had delivered her from this addiction. She walked close to the LORD and had no problem whatsoever; cocaine held no appeal for her and she was drug free. Things went along real well for her and in due time she relaxed in her walk with the LORD and soon fell into it again. This is a modern example of Luke 11:24-26: When the unclean spirit is gone out of a man, he walketh through dry places, seeking rest; and finding none, he saith, I will return unto my house whence I came out. And when he cometh, he findeth it swept and garnished. Then goeth he, and taketh to him seven other spirits more wicked than himself; and they e

nter in, and dwell there: and the last state of that man is worse than the first."

One more observation: what makes some temptations more difficult to deal with is because most at heart are legitimate, God-given desires that the devil has perverted. This includes the desire to eat, to reproduce...Since these are God-given, God will give you the grace(ability, strength) to cope with it. Another thing that hinders victory is when we think we can do it in our own strength, that we can handle it on our own, that we do not need God very much - a little perhaps, sometimes, but not all the time...and therein is the catch. And rest assured, that comes from the pit!

Since this is the case, you will have tell God all you think, feel, want. Tell him how dirty and bad you feel - EVERYTHING! This cannot be emphasized enough. God knows you inside and out - you cannot hide anything from him, so you just might as well admit it. If you enjoy your sin a tad bit, tell Him! Tell him you would like to hate it but that you don't hate it like you should and that you need his help to accomplish it. Make sense?
