"WICHITA, Kan. (May 31) - Dr. George Tiller, who remained one of the nation's few providers of late-term abortions through decades of protests and attacks, was shot and killed Sunday in a church where he was serving as an usher and his wife was in the choir.

The gunman fled, but a 51-year-old suspect was arrested some 170 miles away in suburban Kansas City three hours after the shooting, Wichita Deputy Police Chief Tom Stolz said."

A few weeks ago we felt a chill in the air as we read a government report profiling right-wing pro-lifers as potential terrorist candidates. Some of us expressed feelings of betrayal and injury by what seemed unfair characterizations. We even wondered if we were beginning to see the early signs of state intolerance towards conservative Christians.

This murder of Dr. Tiller is a justification of the concerns of that government report.

Now what we need to do in this situation is not 'denounce' murder in the abstract, while at the same time consoling ourselves in this one case by calling attention to Tillers abortion record.
