It isn't a mere story trying to get a point across, it is a real account of a pastor who was challenged with the commandment to honor his mother, which he did. It was obedience to God when he turned to his mother and asked her what he should do. In all of the cases of a parent/child relationship being tested by persecution that I have heard of (that come to mind right now) the parents have been willing to even see their children die and suffer torture rather than deny the Lord or encourage their children to deny the Lord.

I think this was such a case. This son was being faithful to his heavenly Father by his obedience to the command to honor his mother. Now, if that mother had told him to forsake Christ, that would have been another story. But in this case, both the mother and son were faithful to Jesus Christ.
