I believe that there is a mystery here that we as mortals will not be able to understand until we have had our own personal change. We say "Healing is not the right concept when dealing with resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ." but for some reason, He KEPT the scars. There is a connection of the old body in the formation of the new (as detailed in I Cor. c h. 15).

The thought that overwhelmed me in looking at what happened is that if it had been a situation of merely bringing life back into his old body, and the natural process of healing all of those mortal wounds had to happen, He would have been in bed for many months and the disciples would have had to care for Him until he would barely have been able to creep around and get back to ministry before ascending. I don't even like the thought of what Christ would have been like if he were bound by our limitations, yet so many for a lack of faith in Who He really is tend to bring Him down to our level.

The deep cuts to the flesh and muscle tissue would have taken a long time to heal. The bones that were pulled out of joint in the process of crucifixion would have taken a long time to get back in place. We are so accustomed to seeing the world through the eyes of what doctors and "professionals" can do to heal our wounds (physical, mental or emotional). May God help us to focus on The Creator and His INSTANT power to make all things new! A mustard-seed sized faith in HIM can see greater things than all of the "professionals" on earth can accomplish in 1,000 lifetimes.

The resurrected body was somehow YES "As soon as God the Father spoke." a healed version of the old body. Thomas saw the scars and believed.

OH the MAJESTY of His POWER and YES the main point is to focus on that greatness and realize that when His power is enacted in our personal situations regardless of the type of wound, the healing is perfect because God does all things perfectly.
