Though you could use this and benefit from it, the author of the concordant translation Adolph Ernst Knoch http://www.concordant.org started to believe there is no literal eternal hell and other doctrines. I would be very careful with this translation personally.

The logic is there is only 1 english word for every greek word used. But this does not work in language and can cause great confusion in bible translation.

If you have any good version of the bible you can read it very slowly and get 90% of most of the greek nuances from it.

Of course we can get some light from this and help but it seems they have forced this to happen and "make it" work.

I trust that helps you in discerning this and how you use that tool. E-sword works just as well in many ways and has a great KJV-Greek version for free.
