John makes mention more than once that he was the disciple that Jesus loved. I believe he came to that conclusion because the love that shone forth from Jesus was absolutely compelling. John, and obviously others, could feel the radiation of His love whenever they were near, and His voice made the love explode in the room. When He was there, they came to listen like thirsty sheep come to clear cool water.

I believe the secret of His evangelism was that love, the love of the Father emanating from the Son. While we quibble about methods, He just rested in the essence of love and the Spirit drew them in. The Pharisees, at least most of them, loved other things and scorned the genuine love standing before them. People like that still do, but like some of the Pharisees a few make that 180 turn and fall at His feet.

Our most essential need, by the Father's design, is to be loved. Humble common people get that, and hear Him gladly.

Maybe our evangelism would work better if we actually loved the people we're preaching at? Just a thought...

What I mean by militant evangelism is being proactive in sharing our faith; being on the offensive mode as opposed to being apathetic and passive, cowering at the thought of actively evangelizing the lost; and coming up with a million and one excuses for not caring about sharing our faith with the lost. What I mean by frontline street evangelism is going to where the lost congregate and reaching out to them with the life-saving message of the gospel, as opposed to simply waiting for them to come to us or waiting to build a relationship over a long period of time before feeling we have earned the right to share the gospel, which is completely unbiblical.

The Apostle Paul followed Jesus example of bold, frontline gospel outreach to the lost. His face was set like flint as he sought to spread the gospel everywhere he went. We read of him many times going to public places such as the market places where crowds were found in order to preach the gospel to complete strangers. He did not wait long to build relationships with people before preaching the gospel to them. That's why he got into so much trouble in so many places and riots were started. Even while imprisoned he did not hesitate to share the good news with everyone there and many got converted through his bold witness. May we follow his example which was patterned after our Lord Jesus.

During the time of the First Great Awakening there was much open air preaching going on and many were being converted and discipled. John Wesley trained many preachers who rode on horseback preaching the gospel in the open air from town to town. They were called circuit riders. These anointed preachers did not go around performing healing miracles everywhere they went preaching. Their emphasis was the gospel and souls being saved.

William Booth and the origins of the Salvation Army also comes to mind. They preached on the streets and many were converted and discipled and trained to be frontline gospel soldiers through their ministry.

Would to God that there would be another movement in which God's people are revived and on fire to get the gospel out while there is opportunity.

A word of caution regarding the thinking that Jesus had a message that was warmly received and that His evangelism won the multitudes over to Him. Not so!

Consider that it was not just the Pharisees that were offended at what He taught, but most people were, even those who claimed to be His disciples, see John 6:66 "From that time many of his disciples went back, and walked no more with him." This was because they found His preaching too hard.

At the very end Jesus was only left with the 12 (well 11 actually) and even they dispersed for a season! Jesus actually made it hard for folk, not easy. Yes they were attracted at first by miracles and being fed, but He rebuked them for their shallowness. When he laid the word on the line most did not want it.

Let us not think we have to be 'successful' in our evangelism. We have to be Faithful to the truth. Trying to be successful leads into all sorts of error and compromise.

Would you rebuke Wesley and Whitfield for preaching in the streets! They won multitudes into the kingdom, but they also faced much opposition and upset a great many people. The gospel of the cross is an offense and stumbling block to many. Don't try and make it easy and thereby strip away the power of the gospel, which produces true salvation.

Like I said in my first response on this thread, the rich young ruler came running to Jesus (Mark 10:17) and not vice versa. And Jesus was using the 10 commandments he quoted as a rhetorical device (he was making the point that if you keep all the commandments you can inherit eternal life, which of course is not possible for a lifetime). He was not using them to shame or embarrass the guy. and again this was a one on one interaction.

The apostles generally went into the synagogues or where they were invited or they were defending themselves in front of the authorities.

Again I certainly don't have anything against evangelism. But I think if we strictly look at the numbers, the best way to get someone to hear the gospel in an effective manner may be to get them into a loving church where they will hear the gospel. I think a welcoming environment amidst good Christian folks softens the heart. Many people in the world are never around this environment.

The reason the early church grew so fast was because the lost were seeing how all these new converts were acting and got drawn in.

Matthew 12:38-39

Then some of the scribes and Pharisees answered, saying, "Teacher, we want to see a sign from You."

But He answered and said to them, "An evil and adulterous generation seeks after a sign, and no sign will be given to it except the sign of the prophet Jonah.

When Jesus healed people he generally did it in private and cautioned the recipient to not advertise it. It was out of compassion and not used to draw crowds. Yes we know they came because they heard about the miracles, but it seems to me He did not put on a show to advertise Himself like we see many healing crusades do. The apostles never put on a healing meeting. They preached the gospel and as God moved them they healed the sick.

Jesus' main emphasis in His ministry was the bold and compassionate preaching of the gospel, whether at the temple or in synagogues, in homes, on a one to one basis, or in the open air from town to town. From the start His was a message of repentance and faith-Mark 1:15.

Regarding His many miracles, we must keep in mind that by His miracles He was fulfilling OT prophecy and proving He was indeed the long-awaited Messiah. When the disciples of John the Baptist asked Him on John's behalf whether or not He was truly the Messiah this was His reply to them:

"Go and tell John the things which you hear and see: 5 The blind see and the lame walk; the lepers are cleansed and the deaf hear; the dead are raised up and the poor have the gospel preached to them. 6 And blessed is he who is not offended because of Me."-Matthew 11:4-6(cf. Luke 4:18)

But I can hear the objection, "What about the Apostles and disciples in Acts performing many miracles?"

Considering the following few factors, I'd say it was also for a special reason that there were so many such miracles on such a large scale during that time period:

1. Nowhere in the Word of God are we told that miracles are a must for preaching the gospel. However, we are told that miracles were a distinguishing mark of apostles. Paul told the Corinthians, "Truly the signs of an apostle were accomplished

hed among you with all perseverance, in signs and wonders and mighty deeds."-2 Cor. 12:2

2. The fact that we have not seen the same types of miracles on such a large scale since then.

That is not to say that miracles are not for today. But simply to say I don't believe they are for today on such a large scale as during that time period; and simply to say that miracles do not prove or disprove one's evangelistic ministry or the anointing of the Holy Ghost.

Part of the problem with the scribes and Pharisees is that they were ignoring the signs Jesus already performed. They were dishonest in their rejection. You really can't compare Jesus' treatment of these men with his treatment of the masses.

The miracles performed by Jesus and the apostles obviously gave extra oomph to their message.

Why should it be any different today?

It is argued that Jesus only rebuked the Pharisees. I don't believe there is any clear proof of that in the Word. We know for sure that John the Baptist did not limit his hard rebukes to the scribes and Pharisees, and Jesus' message was essentially the same as John's. Notice what the Word says about John's preaching to the multitudes, not just the scribes and Pharisees:

"Then he said to the multitudes that came out to be baptized by him, "Brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? 8 Therefore bear fruits worthy of repentance, and do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father.' For I say to you that God is able to raise up children to Abraham from these stones. 9 And even now the ax is laid to the root of the trees. Therefore every tree which does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire." 10 So the people asked him, saying, "What shall we do then?" 11 He answered and said to them, "He who has two tunics, let him give to him who has none; and he who has food, let him do likewise." 12 Then tax collectors also came to be baptized, and said to him, "Teacher, what shall we do?" 13 And he said to them, "Collect no more than what is appointed for you." 14 Likewise the soldiers asked him, saying, "And what shall we do?" So he said to them, "Do not intimidate anyone or accuse falsely, and be content with your wages."-Luke 3:7-14

When sharing the gospel on the streets I've found that many times those who are the angriest at the preaching of the gospel are "religious" people who claim to be Christians but hate any mention of repentance. These are not people who dress like "religious" people or carry Bibles, they dress normally or casually. They go to church on a regular basis. But they have bought into a "gospel" that has told them they can take on a profession of faith without repentance. There are multitudes out there who fit that description. They start cursing you out for preaching the truth.

But even with that explanation I would still disagree. In the Sermon on the Mount and other places Christ did in fact recite the 10 Commandments and expounded on them bringing out the spiritual meaning of them in order to bring conviction of sin, righteousness and judgment.

Regarding using God's moral law to embarrass people, why should preaching on God's law to bring conviction of sin be seen or understood that way? I know there are examples of bad preachers out there but there are also many good examples? Why paint such a broad brush?

The account in Matthew is much shorter than the one in Luke. In Luke we are told that right after John gave that rebuke and warning,

"the people asked him, saying, "What shall we do then?" 11 He answered and said to them, "He who has two tunics, let him give to him who has none; and he who has food, let him do likewise."

That indicates that the people in general got the sense that he was also addressing them. Concerning the passage in Luke this is what Matthew Henry writes, which I agree with:

"In Matthew he is said to have preached these same things to many of the Pharisees and Sadducees, that came to his baptism (Mt. 3:7-10); but here he is said to have spoken them to the multitude, that came forth to be baptized of him, v. 7. This was the purport of his preaching to all that came to him, and he did not alter it in compliment to the Pharisees and Sadducees, when they came, but dealt as plainly with them as with any other of his hearers. And as he did not flatter the great, so neither did he compliment the many, or make his court to them, but gave the same reproofs of sin and warnings of wrath to the multitude that he did to the Sadducees and Pharisees; for, if they had not the same faults, they had others as bad. Now observe here,

1. That the guilty corrupted race of mankind is become a generation of vipers; not only poisoned, but poisonous; hateful to God, hating one another. This magnifies the patience of God, in continuing the race of mankind upon the earth, and not destroying that nest of vipers. He did it once by water, and will again by fire.
2. This generation of vipers is fairly warned to flee from the wrath to come, which is certainly before them if they continue such; and their being a multitude will not be at all their security, for it will be neither reproach nor loss to God to cut them off. We are not only warned of this wrath, but are put into a way to escape it, if we look about us in time.
3. There is no way of fleeing from the wrath to come, but by repentance. They that submitted to the baptism of repentance thereby evidenced that they were warned to flee from the wrath to come and took the warning; and we by our baptism profess to have fled out of Sodom, for fear of what is coming upon it.
4. Those that profess repentance are highly concerned to live like penitents (v. 8): "Bring forth therefore fruits meet for repentance, else, notwithstanding your professions of repentance, you cannot escape the wrath to come." By the fruits of repentance it will be known whether it be sincere or no. By the change of our way must be evidenced the change of our mind.
5. If we be not really holy, both in heart and life, our profession of religion and relation to God and his church will stand u

s in no stead at all: Begin not now to frame excuses from this great duty of repentance, by saying within yourselves, We have Abraham to our father. What will it avail us to be the children of godly parents if we be not godly, to be within the pale of the Church if we be not brought into the bond of the covenant?

6. We have therefore no reason to depend upon our external privileges and professions of religion, because God has no need of us or of our services, but can effectually secure by his own honour and interest without us. If we were cut off and ruined, he could raise up to himself a church out of the most unlikely,â€™children to Abraham even out of stones.

However if we are honest (and most aren't) much of what we see today in the western church are not the genuine gifts. You are very bold to declare you have the same power and authority to operate in the same gifts as the Apostles, so can you confirm when you last raised the dead, gave sight to the blind or raised up a lifelong cripple. Or have you even seen these type of instant miracles. I have been around Charismatic churches and so called healing meetings for much of the last 30 years and I can honestly say I have never seen this type of miracle. Yes I have seen and know of folk that were healed of minor ailments, but nothing on this level of miracle. I know folk who have recovered from major diseases over time after being prayed for, but we are talking here of a miracle sign where healing is instant like the Apostles and Christ.

I am not in unbelief that God can and does move in these gifts, but I don't see this and folk who think they should be doing these signs end up trying to produce something in their own strength (even if they are good intentioned) and the result is a bad testimony because they claim to give something they don't have or produce.

Where does that leave the gospel message when you claim the God who will save you from sin will also deliver you from sickness and then they are not healed? If you were wrong about that then maybe you are wrong about salvation would be the logical thought process. Of course the healing evangelist always has an answer such as 'you need to hold on in faith' or the 'manifestation will come later' or 'if the symptoms come back it's just the devil trying to steal your healing'. Funny we don't read any of those excuses in the bible.

My concern recently is with a certain sentiment I've perceived here; a sentiment which says something along the lines of , "Street evangelism as we've come to know it (e.g. handing out tracts, intentionally sharing the gospel with strangers on the streets, street preaching) has not been working. Maybe we need to rethink it and do something much different." It's a sentiment that seems to downplay the types of street evangelism that many of us seek to continue to do faithfully unto the Lord.

In our town we block off main street one night a month in the summer and have a community festival / art walk of sorts. The thing that is notably absent from their message is that fact that God loves sinners and longs for them to come to repentance. It is as if they do not desire for any of the people to actually come to repentance, but would rather just condemn them. It is almost like they are happy that the people are lost.

I think Jesus did preach, everywhere He went. Paul was certainly a street preacher. Yet their preaching was not simply condemnation. I think both in a way. What we do know is that signs and miracles followed to confirm the word, and that they were much publicized. Many came to hear both Christ and the apostles because they had heard of the miracles being performed.

What I have noticed is that some believers seem to be overly focused on the manifestations, seemingly for their own sake. There is a signs and wonders movement afoot that has, in my opinion, gone off the deep end where manifestations of the power of God are concerned.

I guess I see things pretty simply sometimes, and to me it should look like this. If I am full of the Holy Spirit, then God should be able to use me to minister to others in supernatural ways. But the purpose of this ministry is not so that we can all focus on manifestations. It is just a natural part of being filled with the Holy Spirit of God. It is really nothing special, although to our fleshly mind it seems out of the ordinary. But the end result of all of it should be to point to Christ. If people are not maturing in the things of God, if they are not growing into the full measure of the stature of a full grown man in Christ, then what was the point anyway?
