I know many moderns give little credence to the importance of keeping the LORD's Day holy, but I beg to differ - this was something that had its origins in the creation. We have learned from experience how beneficial it is to take a reprieve from unnecessary work one day a week, using this day to focus on worship and fellowship with other Believers.

Many years ago a tornado swept through our community in the wee hours of a Sunday morning destroying a home, hog barn and other out buildings. Our brotherhood went out there as soon as it became common knowledge and the men worked to move the hogs, the women to cook for all the disaster workers. At the day's end we were tired. No one had a day of rest for two weeks and we could tell it physically. Never again unless it is a serious emergency. It ain't worth it. Then I understood why God set an example for us to take one day a week for rest. And I applaud this lady for sticking to her co

Actually, Christians who don't observe the Sabbath are not breaking it. Whether they are Jews or Gentiles, they simply are not under the Mosaic law.

The book of Galatians documents Paul's argument regarding those who were misled into thinking they had to obey the law of Moses.

We who are Jesus' disciples are not under the law of Moses; we are under the law of Christ (1 Cor 9:21, Gal 6:2).

Those who attempt to keep the OT law and the law of Christ are adulterers (Rom 7:3-4).

That being said I do think it's a good idea to go to church and generally take it easy on Sunday if possible but there is no condemnation on those who can't or don't want to.

Amen Daniel. This is something Christians can and should agree to disagree on without dividing over it.

A few things to add to what Todd shared.

The Sabbath was an ordinance given to the nation of Israel under the Old Covenant.

Therefore the children of Israel shall keep the Sabbath, to observe the Sabbath throughout their generations as a perpetual covenant. 17 It is a sign between Me and the children of Israel forever; for in six days the Lord made the heavens and the earth, and on the seventh day He rested and was refreshed. -Exodus 31:16-17

And remember that you were a slave in the land of Egypt, and the Lord your God brought you out from there by a mighty hand and by an outstretched arm; therefore the Lord your God commanded you to keep the Sabbath day. -Deuteronomy 5:15

Moreover I also gave them My Sabbaths, to be a sign between them and Me, that they might know that I am the Lord who sanctifies them. -Ezekiel 20:12

In the New Testament, there is no mention of any sabbath day being binding on Christians today. To the contrary, Colossians 2 tells us we are not obliged to keep any sabbath days, which would include Saturday or Sunday Sabbaths.

16 So let no one judge you in food or in drink, or regarding a festival or a new moon or sabbaths, 17 which are a shadow of things to come, but the substance is of Christ. -Col. 2:16-17

As Todd shared, the sabbath was part of the Old Mosaic Covenant. The New Testament teaches us that the Old Mosaic Covenant was made obsolete with the establishment of the New Covenant in Christ. Hebrews 8:6-13 makes this very clear. I'll share verse 13 here:

In that He says, "A new covenant," He has made the first obsolete. Now what is becoming obsolete and growing

ng old is ready to vanish away.-Heb. 8:13

A common objection to this viewpoint is, "But what about the Ten Commandments? Aren't we still commanded to keep them? And isn't the Sabbath a part of them? How can we tell people they are under obligation to keep the Ten Commandments while telling them they are not under obligation to keep the 4th of those Commandments?"

The Ten Commandments were a summary of the whole Mosaic Law, they were "technically" a part of that whole system of law. With the "discarding" of the Mosaic Law, the Ten Commandments were also "technically" made obsolete as being part of that whole system. I'll try to clarify because I do believe 9 of those Commandments are still in force today, I do not advocate antinomianism (immorality or lawlessness).

But first I'll share a New Testament passage that seems to teach that the Ten Commandments "passed away" with the establishment of the New Covenant in Christ:

"8 But if the ministry of death, written and engraved on stones, was glorious, so that the children of Israel could not look steadily at the face of Moses because of the glory of his countenance, which glory was passing away, how will the ministry of the Spirit not be more glorious? 9 For if the ministry of condemnation had glory, the ministry of righteousness exceeds much more in glory. 10 For even what was made glorious had no glory in this respect, because of the glory that excels. 11 For if what is passing away was glorious, what remains is much more glorious."-2 Corinthians 3:8-11

Paul says that the "ministry of death and condemnation" was "passing away." And that "ministry" was "written and engraved on stones" at mount Sinai, clearly referring to the Ten Commandments.

So how can nine of the Ten Commandments be binding today if they were all made obsolete? Because 9 of those Commandments are also part of God's eternal, unchanging, universal Moral Law. That universal moral law is taught throughout both the Old and New Testaments. The Old Mosaic Covenant (including the Ten Commandments) also contained that universal moral law code. But the Mosaic Covenant, as a "whole system of law," was made obsolete by the New Covenant in Christ.

All the moral laws taught in the Old Covenant (including nine of the Ten Commandments) were carried over into the New Covenant. As Todd shared, God's moral law which is binding on Christians today is called "The Law of Christ."

"To those outside the law I became as one outside the law (not being outside the law of God but under the law of Christ) that I might win those outside the law."-1 Corinthians 9:21

"Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ."-Galatians 6:2

I know it can get confusing at first. What I'm proposing here is termed New Covenant Theology. Three major Theological systems are Covenant Theology, Dispensationalism, and New Covenant Theology.

All that being said, I do believe it is good for us to rest from work at least one day a week because our bodies need it to function well.

It is often pointed out by Seventh Day Adventists and others that the Sabbath was instituted at the creation of the world, before the Mosaic Covenant, according to Genesis 2:2-3. However, we do not read of Adam, Noah, Abraham or any other patriarch keeping the sabbath before the Exodus. The earliest mention of the Sabbath after Genesis 2 is in Exodus 16. We're told there that Israel was commanded to keep the Sabbath about 2 and a half months after the Exodus.

But how can we account for the fact that Genesis says God sanctified the seventh day when He rested from creation?

I'll say first that resting from work at least one day a week can be a wise and needful principle to observe due to our bodies needing some rest to function well enough and to be productive. We were not meant to be workaholics and work seven days a week with no days of rest.

Also, God's resting on the seventh day was symbolic of a few things. Firstly, it was symbolic of the future Sabbath instituted through Moses. Secondly, it was symbolic of the future rest Israel would have from their enemies in Canaan.

“The Lord gave them rest all around, according to all that He had sworn to their fathers. And not a man of all their enemies stood against them; the Lord delivered all their enemies into their hand. 45 Not a word failed of any good thing which the Lord had spoken to the house of Israel. All came to pass.”-Joshua 21:44-45

Hebrews 3 and 4 mentions that “earthly” rest which many Israelites failed to enter because of their unbelief.

And thirdly, it was symbolic of the spiritual rest we experience as believers in Christ, as Jesus declared in Matthew 11:28-30,

“28 Come to Me, all you who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. 29 Take My yoke upon you and learn from Me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. 30 For My yoke is easy and My burden is light.”

Hebrews 3 and 4 teaches that the rest God gave Israel in Canaan was symbolic of the spiritual rest we experience in Christ (see Hebrews 3:16-19 and the whole of Hebrews 4). Hebrews 4 also teaches that God’s resting on the seventh day was also symbolic of that spiritual rest in Christ and ceasing from our own works. I’ll share the pertinent portion of Hebrews 4 here:

“1 Therefore, since a promise remains of entering His rest, let us fear lest any of you seem to have come short of it. 2 For indeed the gospel was preached to us as well as to them; but the word which they heard did not profit them, not being mixed with faith in those who heard it. 3 For we who have believed do enter that rest, as He has said: “So I swore in My wrath, “They shall not enter My rest,” although the works were finished from the foundation of the world. 4 For He has spoken in a certain place of the seventh day in this way: “And God rested on the seventh day from all His works”; 5 and again in this place: “They shall not enter My rest.” 6 Since therefore it remains that some must enter it, and those to whom it was first preached did not enter because of disobedience, 7 again He designates a certain day, saying in David, “Today,” after such a long time, as it has been said: “Today, if you will hear His voice, Do not harden your hearts.” 8 For if Joshua had given them rest, then He would not afterward have spoken of another day. 9 There remains therefore a rest for the people of God. 10 For he who has entered His rest has himself also ceased from his works as God did from His.”-Hebrews 4:1-10

When I was young and my wife and I were newly married we both kept a Saturday Sabbath. For about the first 7 years of our marriage we didn't work on Saturday, but attended a Church and witnessed on the streets.

While I was doing this, I was in the Marine Corp. It was rare I had to break the Sabbath. The majority of the time I was in , I didn't work Saturdays but Saturday night till Thursday night. I was able to keep the Sabbath, I know the Lord made a way for my wife and I all through this.

Only occasionally on a special duty or detachment I had to work. Even then I was blessed to be able to have my Sabbath uninterrupted. You would think the Marine Corp would make this impossible, but God always made a way.

I was not seventh day Adventist, neither was my wife, we were more seventh day Pentecostals (Im sure there are a few left)

We never made it a 'law' to anyone outside of ourselves because under the new covenant Sabbath keeping is not commanded (you wont find Gentiles commanded to keep the Sabbath). Some Churches did and they judged others as inferior

to them because of it. When I spoke up and said "Their righteousness is imputed, the Sabbath does not add to righteousness"...you would have thought I just introduced Baal worship into the mix.

But, I appreciate and understand those who keep a Sabbath...and I think they are better off and I was better off.
