On the opposite end of the spectrum is my pastor at the church I have attended for about 15 months now. He hasn't had a salary or any visible means of support for the last 15 years.

He and his wife, also a pastor simply pray (and wait which is the most painful part) and God has met their needs for this entire period of time. In fact, another ministry affiliated somewhat with ours paid their rent for 8+ years.

The bottom line is that Jesus pays for what He orders. I don't think any job, including a secular job, should be about the money at all.

As a full time pastor I have asked this very question many times -- I have in the past asked for a raise only because of cost of living. Currently I am making \$31,200 a year. plus the parsonage and utilities are paid by the church and a health insurance benefit (although it does not pay much unless we get really sick). So I guess I am doing well, but I also see it as an obligation to be a man of the Word and prayer as well as ministry. The church is only about 45 people so it does not require a lot of time to administrate. So the extra hours go to prayer and study along with reading books (mostly about revival right now). Plus listening to other sermons from sermonindex ;-) because I need to be preached at too. Considering my last church tried literally to starve me out, I guess God has balanced the scales a little.

I believe a pastor that is full time should have enough to meet needs and live within his means. Good stewardship is about money management and pastors should be examples of this. If you don't have a lot of worldly pursuits, you don't have a lot of expenses. If you're not dominated by the -- 'I have to have that now' bug you won't have a bunch of debt to pay off either -- learned that one a little late but not too late.

I agree that those who are full time should be giants spiritually -- they should be men of God in every sense of the Word. Such men of genuine prayer and uncompromised preaching are worth their weight in gold and as such their salary as well.

There's definitely a double-standard when it comes to employing our preachers. But rather than asking if we're paying them too much or too little when comparing to ourselves, it should be considered how we're often indulging ourselves.

Paul worked for a living. He was also such an instrument of God. But it should be clear that he wasn't living for riches. More than likely, he denied a wealthy family (look at his education and history), in favor of the life he took for Christ.

Now, some of the most humble men that I've seen serving the Lord were those who were alright using the same suit every Sunday, and needed little more. If you were to offer a pay increase, it would go to good use- they would spend it on serving the Lord in another way.

This should be an example for how we look at ourselves. Do we deserve the fruits of our labor, even with our jobs? Sure, if that's what you're focused on. But how much better could your extra be used?

I'm not saying we should demand pastors who live in practical poverty, but just as we often realize that others might not need all of the indulgences they have, we should be examining ourselves. Hopefully, your pastor knows that- it's a good sign that they really are living for God, and not serving the church like it's a wage-deserving job.

I personally feel for my pastor. He does ok for a congregation of about 70, making about \$30,000 a year, and lives in a old paid-for parsonage. However, because a few pillars in our church recently left it, taking their money with them, my pastor and his wife have recently taken up part-time jobs as substitute teachers in the public schools to better help make ends meet.

I really feel for them. I wish they did not have to do such. They make about \$60 each a day when they sub for the school system. My pastor also plays a little bit in a blue-grass gospel band, which allows him to make about \$100. My pastor and his wife have 2 kids, one in college, and a daughter that is 12. My pastor is one very much dedicated to prayer and study, and I hate to think that he is having to take away from such in order to help make ends meet. Granted, things might not be so tight if our church didn't take annual trips to Uruguay S. America, of which he has to set aside about 5 grand for this work which God has called he and his family to do. Even then, things would be somewhat tight.
